Matheson: I'd just like to put the stipulation on it, that all net proceeds go to future land acquisitions we're selling City owned land, I think we should do that, or capital improvements. I don't believe this money should be used for operational costs. Clarke – Yes, I'll amend my motion to put the monies, the \$630,000 into an appropriate, the net proceeds, the appropriate sinking fund or something for land acquisition, or capital improvement.

10. CONTINUED FROM NOVEMBER 26, 2018 - SAILFISH BALLFIELD AND CITY GARAGE PROPERTY:

RFP #2018-204; SALE (OR LONG TERM LEASE) AND DEVELOPMENT OF TWO CITY OWNED PARCELS SAILFISH BALLFIELD AND CITY GARAGE PROPERTY.

Commissioner Matheson commented that he feels it is best to cancel it in the interest of our residents and tax payers.

Commissioner Meier thanked the companies that submitted the proposals. Though he would like to see either project in the City, he agrees with cancelling the RFP as either of these projects is at the right place, at the right time.

Mayor Bruner commented that the property of the ballfields is a beautiful piece of property and would like to have a workshop where the commissions decide what would be best in that space. Our goal is to move the ballparks over to 10th Street. Interested in several workshops and bring developers in.

Commissioner Meier reported that he does not think that neither a ballpark, nor townhouses are the best use for the property. Not interested in cancelling the RFP if it is going to come back up in a year and not interested in selling it to developers anywhere in the near future.

Commissioner Clarke commented that once a plan is developed for 10th Street, good to review.

Commissioner Glass Leighton commented that the City needs to address revenue for the City. Though green space is vital, we need to figure out a way to pay for what we are using and what we will use in the future.

Public Comment:

- Mark Breckbill Commented on the missed revenue on the ballfield property and the expense associated with the process of the proposals submitted.
- Sally Dadko Rose Riverside Dr.; Joined by Linda Shane of Alamanda Way, commented on a petition she has for the opposition of the sale of the Sailfish Park.
- 3) Armond Pasquale Seminole St.; In favor of saving the ballfields, likes to see more parks/greenspace.
- 4) Helen McBride Flamingo Ave.; Commented that she would like to see a park in the location of the ballfield.
- Faye James Florida St.; Disappointed in the rejection of the affordable housing, in favor of developing a full facility on 10th Street.
- 6) Eric Wickstrom California; Feels there are plenty of parks, the community needs hotels, housing, new people, create new businesses and an art district. 10th St. facility is a beautiful place for recreation. The development would bring in more tax dollars.

Commission discussion included the City's role in this process, the value of public land, the plans being developed for the 10 Street Facility, and the time frame to be expected.

Tom Reetz, Senior Planner, briefly presented on the Savannah Place Apartments RPUD.

Doug Fitzwater presented on the application. Jim Goldasich presented on the environmental impacts and wetlands, exotics removal and the preservation area. Steve Marquart reviewed the stormwater management plan.

- Henry Pruitt St. Lucie Blvd.; Building owner neighboring the property, area has drainage issues, density concerns and recommends the Commission vote this project down.
- Suzy Hutchenson Sunset Trace Circle; Helping People Succeed located there and commented on concerns of density and the footage between buildings and increased crime.
- 3) Kristin Ruceolo NE Lima Vias; Commented on concern on loss of privacy.
- 4) Denise Dow NE Vanda Terr.; Retired to the area and is concerned about the extra 1,000 people coming to live, the environmental effects on the turtles and birds, and the affordable housing and added crime.
- 5) Lindsay Campbell NE Lima Vias; opposes having their home exposed to three story buildings. Understands the property should be built, but would like to see it reduced; concerns of school availability and environmental impacts.

6) Michael Getlic – NE Elm Terr.; Commented that though the project is down to three stories, there is another building behind it that is four stories. Suggests the project be built in another area of town.
