Statement by City Manager Dyess:

During Roll Call, for the record, Dyess requested the board state whether they are present in person or attending the meeting virtually.

Mayor Meier requested a moment of silence for the death of George Floyd, Brianna Taylor, Ahmad Arbury and countless others. A moment of silence was observed.

PROCLAMATIONS

1. GARDEN WEEK - JUNE 7-13, 2020

Ms. Donna Berger, Chairperson of the Garden Club of Stuart thankfully accepted the Proclamation and announced their Garden Tour on March 20th and presented the City with a beautiful purple orchid in honor of Garden Week.

PRESENTATIONS

2. DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH UPDATE

Ms. Carol Ann Vitani of the Florida Department of Health in Martin County provided an update on the COVID-19 status in Martin County, reporting the case count at 917 positive cases and 13 deaths. 42% of the cases are from Indiantown and 37% of the cases are from Stuart zip codes 34994 and 34997. The positivity rate is 8.3%, above the state average but in the target range. Testing provided in May was successful and is currently still provided at this time. With the available testing, the number of cases is expected to rise. Vitani encouraged all to continue safety/hygiene measures and announced additional testing sites in Indiantown and Stuart.

3. HURRICANE PREPAREDNESS PRESENTATION

Kate Cotner, Florida Power and Light (FPL) Senior External Affairs Coordinator presented on hurricane season preparations, customer outreach and communication, investments, lessons learned from past hurricanes, and the restoration process.

Police Captain Derek Ortado presented an update on the City of Stuart Emergency Management Plan, reviewed the current COVID-19 information and per NOAA Hurricane Tracker, reported the 2020 Atlantic Hurricane Season Outlook prediction of 19 named storms. Presentation included goals to prepare year around, adjustment of plans to current events, shelter protocol changes, and City EOC preparations.

Commissioner Bruner

- Thanked City Manager for moving Green Market to Flagler, felt the residents liked it.**

- Commented that she is glad to see some more people in the room and hopes that more can join us soon.

Vice Mayor Clarke

- Commented that Arts Moment is usually the first Monday of the month and will return.
- Received box of face masks from the Health Dept., placed in front hall for people to take.
- Shocked by recent flooding and thanked Dave Peters and Milton Leggett, our departments for what they do.
- Commented on the violation that occurred in the CRB Meeting (6/2/2020) Zoom recording, wonder if the people can be traced, stated it is a violation and against the people in our community; thankful for our manager for the way he has handled everything and wanted to let the citizens know that we were wronged and unhappy about the situation.
- Inquired about housing as it has been put on hold because of COVID, perhaps it could be a D&D at a future meeting.
- Situation/murder of Mr. George Floyd, she was approached and worked with community and City Attorney and looked at what our congress did to pass anti-racism came up with a diversity resolution, significance of June 8th, the 8th item on the agenda, and Mr. Floyd was held for 8+ minutes. Ask Police Chief to give info, guidance, and all to think of this. Commented on the participation in the Black Lives Matter and want things to change for the better and we continue to make a difference step by step.

Commissioner Matheson


- Thanked the Vice Mayor and complimented her on her words.
- Apologized for and condemned the racist comments made over the CRB zoom meeting.
- NAACP Office is offering COVID-19 testing on June 20th.
- Commented on the recent rain and flooding, our River went from a B+ to a D when graded by the Florida Oceanographic Society. Would like the fertilizer Ordinance to be put on the website as a reminder as fertilizers should not be used through hurricane season. Thankful the Corp and SFWMD for working with us.

Mayor Meier

- As Mayor of the City, apologized to Mrs. Faye James and Mr. Lewis, the Jewish community members and all members of the community for the attack.

- 1) Helen McBride – Flamingo Avenue; Commented that it should have never of happened but thanked them for their apology.

Mayor Meier commented on investigating such attacks and noted the protections or the First Amendment, but a formal complaint is being filed with the IC3.

Vice Mayor Clarke requested that the City's boards and committees receive training on how to deal with disruptions.

 **6:48 PM COMMENTS BY CITY MANAGER**

City Manager Dyess

- **Introduced Ms. Natasha Chen, a law student from the University of Florida Miami as a spontaneous Arts Moment to come forward and read a poem. Natasha commented on equality and read "Let America Be America Again".**
- **Housing Workshop policy direction is currently being implemented in the Comp Plan.**
- **In reference to the Zoom bombing issue, as open government, stated the meeting was not "hacked," people are not restricted from the meeting just as they are not restricted from entering the Chambers. There is a higher level of security by separating the board members attending via Zoom from the public attending via Zoom, but during public comment, anyone can still make inappropriate comments until mutes as quickly as possible.**

Mayor Meier asked if Public Works could provide a presentation on the flooding in the areas of Ocean, Flaming and Dolphin at an upcoming meeting. Asked Attorney Mortell about inappropriate public comment and his right as the meeting Chair to silence them.

Attorney Mortell replied stating the City has a civility code and the person can be asked to leave but if not hurting anyone, could say what they want.

COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC (5 Minutes Max.)

- 1) Faye James – Kanner Hwy; Commented on her experience as a CRB board member during the June 2nd meeting and quoted the zoom meeting interruption offensive word many times, stating she felt unprotected in her own home and upset that the board or City didn't apologize. Stated the CBR Chair, Frank Wacha laughed when the disruption happened; thanked Commissioner Matheson and Mayor Meier for their phone conversations and apologies.
- 2) Betty Brinkley – Nassau Ave.; Commented that CRA money is spent in downtown and East Stuart is treated differently, commented that they are overlooked. Feels they are not treated equal, as with the Coronavirus, no masks are being handed out.
- 3) Jonny Hunter – MLK Blvd.; Moved to comment on Item #6.
- 4) Donald Duffy – MLK Bld.; Commented on equal rights, commented on the President of the United States.
- 5) Jimmy Smith – Apache Ave.; NAACP President, commented about the complaint about the Zoom meeting and glad to see that the City publicly apologized, commented that he knows the City Manager has and will continue to do his best to prevent such instances. Announced June 20th COVID-19 testing available with food, clothing, school supplies, census registration, and the Sheriff and Police Department at the NAACP.

Clarke requested Smith get with City Manager and Clerk to know what it takes to be an advisory board Committee so people know that they can come and be a part of a committee.

- 6) Mosezella Williams – 15th; Explained a neighbor's story about not getting police help and is concerned about when she calls the Police, with all going on in society, wants to know she can trust the police.
- 7) ZOOM – Frank Wacha – Commented that he would not tolerate racism and stated he was shocked by the CRB Zoom Meeting disruption and apologized that he did not react differently. Commented that the head of the NAACP would be a great addition to some of our boards.
- 8) ZOOM – James Christie III – Commented on a direct correlation between Ms. Brinkly's comment of East Stuart being neglected and Ms. James's comment about the head of a board chuckling at a racial statement three times. Feels the Chair should have apologized and removed from the board immediately.

Tom Reetz presented with a brief power point presentation reviewing the location, site plan, and conditions of approval.

Applicant Mr. Barghouthy came forward and answered questions about alcohol sales and rental space. Provided Clerk Petition to Support Speedy Mart for the record.

Public Comment:

- 1) Jonny Hunter – MLK Blvd.; Opposes the sale to Mr. Barghouthy, feels he is a racist and doesn't want him in the community.**
- 2) Adam Jolly – Walton Lake Dr. PSL; Commented that the plaza never used to sell alcohol, statute states that alcohol cannot be sold within 200 feet from a school without commission approval. Opposed to this waiver.**
- 3) ZOOM - James Christie III – Requested clarification on the transfer of ownership, opposed.**
- 4) Jonny Hunter – Came forward again and stated he does not want the man in their community.**

8. CELEBRATING DIVERSITY:

RESOLUTION No. 69-2020; A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF STUART, FLORIDA, CELEBRATING THE DIVERSITY OF OUR COMMUNITY AND DENOUNCING ALL ACTS OF RACISM, INTOLERANCE AND UNLAWFUL DISCRIMINATION, PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

Vice Mayor Clarke read the Resolution in its entirety and commented on the divides coming to a head. When she was approached about what she was going to do about the injustices, she received assistance from Donna Dupuy to use Charlottesville's Resolution as a model and start in the City of Stuart. Some may say it is a PR gesture because of what is going on in the world now but stated that they are wrong. It is a bold statement for what comes next. As Dr. King has stated, "the journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step". Wants the City to move forward, have a better Police Department and better community relationship. We are better together. Commented we may need a racial reconciliation committee/East Stuart Advisory Committee with regular input from the East Stuart Community.

Mayor Meier is in support of a committee and commented on Section 5, addressing the logistics and what may be best, allowing the community to take the lead and what the City's role would be.

Commissioner Matheson thanked Vice Mayor Clarke for her leadership and comments, supports the idea of a committee as well. Stated he needs to hear the community's feedback and admitted, as a white male, having privilege and wants to actively work to stop it, and fight for equality. An advisory committee would help him to do that as he will never understand but the first steps are for him to admit it and fight to stop racism. Agrees that it should not be directly under the City but supported by the City.

Police Chief Tumminelli came forward and commented on the current situation. There are over 800,000 police officers in the US, and he oversees 46 of them here in

Stuart. He stated how unfortunate the situation was and that a person wearing the same uniform as he did something so ugly in Minneapolis and it affects them in Stuart. He has been reviewing our policies and procedures and read the Stuart Police Mission Statement. The Chief will not tolerate racism in his department and reported that he has suspended the use of carotid restraint.

Vice Mayor Clarke asked Chief Tumminelli about reprimand policies. Chief responded that if it does not fall under the first amendment and falls under the case law of Chicago, the employee is subject to discipline/termination.


Public Comment:

- 1) **Faye James – Kanner Hwy;** Thanked the Commission for the Resolution and noted that she provided a letter to the City Clerk for the Commissioners about an advisory board.
- 2) **Elmira Gainey – Sterling Dr.;** In favor of a committee or board and would like people of the community and diverse backgrounds to be involved, feels it's time.
- 3) **Helen McBride – Flamingo Ave.;** Explained past PTA meeting story in relation to why the black mothers did not attend their meetings to demonstrate that adjustments must be made to get to know one another's lifestyles to allow all to be included.
- 4) **Mosezella Williams – 15th;** Commented on the board teaching communication between officers and the community, willing to be a volunteer.

Commissioner Bruner emotionally commented on her feelings/concerns for the community and wanted all to know how much they care about this subject. Wanted to keep the focus on bad police officers and have the police be involved in the board/committee.

Seven (7) people sworn; Tom Reetz and Kevin Freeman, City of Stuart, Juan Fernandez of AHS, Doug Fitzwater of Lucido and Associates, Susan O'Rourke of O'Rourke Traffic Engineering and Planning, and Bill Mathers, Civil Engineer.

Tom Reetz presented the site plan, proposed future land use, zoning, site design layout, developer contribution, environmental comment and the Local Planning Agency (LPA) approval information at the May 21, 2020 meeting with conditions.

Kevin Freeman presented the data provided from the Martin County Engineer pertaining to traffic/intersection. This project will contribute approximately \$420,000 to the County in impact fees. Reviewed staff recommendation.

Applicant Juan Fernandez, AHS came forward and briefly explained his company and the project. Doug Fitzwater, Lucido and Associates presented on Harbor Grove then Ms. Susan O'Rourke presented briefly on the traffic engineering.

Mayor Meier and Mr. Fernandez discussed building height options. Meier would like to see a section of the units carved out at an 80 to 100 market rate before second reading.
