Carol Ann Vitani, Florida Department of Health provided an update on the Coronavirus stating the Martin county case count is 2,864 and 42 deaths. Positivity rate is 14%. A daily report is also available on the Martin County website at www.martin.fl.us using the COVID-19 Alert tab, providing test results, hospital capacity, and more. Commented on possible scams, the Florida Department of Health will not contact you about your Social Security Number or financial information. Working closely with martin County School District about school reopening in the Fall. Announced testing sites and encouraged continued social distancing, and hygiene measures. Thanked the City for the use of the electronic billboards for public messaging.

Vice Mayor Clarke explained that she pulled Resolution No. 87-2020 for the City Manager to report how much money is coming into our community and what the City would expect to receive.

City Manager explained the allocation from the state distribution to the County as \$28M and the City can apply for direct expenses which are totaled at approximately \$60-70,000. In communication with Assistant County Administrator and the County plans to release a mortgage, rent and business program to provide assistance to the community within the next week/week and a half. City residents and businesses are eligible, but applications must go through the County.

Mayor Meier commented on recent articles on a future eviction crisis and the destabilizing factor on society. Stated he would like to see some or all the funds from the cancelled fireworks show be contributed to the local fund.

 Exhibit A Legal Description, 2 of these 3 condominium Units, structured as a condominium, therefore the Ordinance should attach the entire condominium property. A Boundary Plat will be done.

22. PROPOSED ART/VINYL WRAPPING ON TRAFFIC CONTROL BOXES WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS

Pinal Gandhi-Savdas, CRA Administrator presented, stating there are 37 traffic boxes, 25 within the CRA and 12 outside the CRA. Martin County owns and maintains the boxes and approves of the City wrapping the boxes, but City would maintain them. Cost is \$500-\$700 per box, totaling \$25-30,000. Vinyl life expectancy is approximately 3 years. Staff requests direction from the Commission.

Brief Commission discussion resulted in opposing the wrapping as they felt there is a better use of the CRA funds. Vice Mayor Clarke would like to keep the project in the long-range plan.
